## BEFORE AN IMMIGRATION ARREST

**DEVELOP AN EMERGENCY RESPONSE PLAN** 

Keep all of your important documents in an easily accessible place.

Make copies of these documents for a family member or close friend to keep in case of emergency.

- Passport
- Birth Certificate
- Marriage License
- Car Titles
- Property Deeds
- All immigration documents
  - Including "A" number if you have one

#### Speak with a trusted immigration attorney to assess your individual immigration situation.

Always have the number or card of a respected legal service provider or immigration lawyer in case of emergency.

Your family should also have these numbers.

Memorize that family member's number.

#### Have an Emergency Plan at Your Place of Work

Ask if your coworkers are willing to stay silent and ask to speak with a lawyer in the event that immigration comes to your workplace.

If your workplace has a union, speak with the union representative to better learn how to prepare in case immigration comes to your workplace.

### Have a Plan to Protect Your Family

- Prepare a "Power of Attorney" form to ensure the proper care of your children with a relative or family friend in case you are detained or deported.
- Obtain a valid passport for your children.
- If your child is a citizen of the United States, obtain a passport for them as soon as possible.
- They will need this to travel outside of the country and prove citizenship later.
- If your child is not a citizen of the U.S., obtain a passport from their country of citizenship. You can get this from your country's consulate.
- Register your child as a citizen of your country at that country's consulate so you do not have problems there once you arrive.
  - For example, in some countries, children that are not registered cannot attend school.
